1. Catalog Course Description:

This course is part of the ethnic dance series offerings in the World Dance division and is the second in a series of three levels of traditional Polynesian dance. The focus of this course is to learn Polynesian dance technique at an intermediate level

2. Prerequisite(s):

Dance 173R or previous dance experience

3. Course Alignment with University and Program Mission and Aims:

This course is in correlation with the AIMS document of a BYU education by beginning class with a spiritual thought and prayer, enlarging character through expression of movement and increasing understanding of culture that will impact life long learning.

4. Required Course Materials:

“Ethnic Dance Tech I - Polynesian” available at the BYU Bookstore

5. Course Intended Learning Outcomes:

1. Acquaint the student with the basic movement techniques and styles of Polynesian dancing.
2. Introduce the student to the history of Polynesian dance with the myths and legends as to why the dances are done.
3. Develop and increase coordination and rhythm.
4. Develop a greater understanding and appreciation for the Polynesian culture through dance.

6. Learning Activities/Course Requirement:

Practical

You will learn a dance and perform that dance for evaluation. There will be 5 areas that you will need to pay particular attention to in order to receive a good grade. Those areas's are as follow: Kahea's (The call, singing, or shout with in a dance) need to be loud, concise, and full of energy. Eye's need to watch hands, audience, and attention to interest as compared to boredom. Fingers, Hand's, and Elbows need to be straight, together, and lifted. Foot movements will need to be performed correctly. Lastly Facial Expressions need to be

appropriate to the dance and full of enthusiasm.

Midterm

A midterm will be administered in class and during the class hour. The test will consist of multiple-choice, short answer, and short essay questions. There will be a short review in class and there will be a review of page numbers posted on the Blackboard.

Final Exam

A Final Exam will be given during class. The test will consist of multiple-choice, short answer, and short essay questions. There will be a short review in class and there will be a review of page numbers posted on the Blackboard.
